

No Beer Sales **On Sunday Here**

Monday night at the Tryon Town Council meeting the Board repealed the present Sunday ABC sales effective Monday, July 14th. This prohibits the sale of beer and wine on Sunday for all businesses except social clubs or businesses with brown bagging permits.

In other action the Board approved the 1980-81 town budget of \$692,693 with a tax rate of 40c per \$100 valuation.

Weather Thursday: high 85, low 63, rain .40; Friday: high 90, low 62; Saturday: high 91, low 65; Sunday: high 90, low 68; Monday: high 86, low 62, rain .23. For the month of June the precipitation was 7.36 inches. The average for June is 5.00 inches. To date this year the precipitation has been 39.99 inches and the average to date is 30.84 inches, leaving a surplus of 9.15 inches.

The U.S. Supreme Court in a 5-4 vote ruled Monday that the federal government and individual states do not have to pay for most abortions wanted by women on welfare.

The federal government must pay the Sioux Indian Nation more than \$100 million for Black Hills land taken from the tribe more than a century ago, the Supreme Court ruled Monday. Only Justice William H. Rehnquit dissented.

The 35.2 million Social Security checks being mailed this week will be \$1.4 billion bigger, reflecting a 14.3 percent cost of living increase to beneficiaries of the program. The increase is the largest annual boost since Social Security was linked to Consumer Price Index in 1975.
