Bloodmobile Here Monday, Aug. 25

Red Cross will launch its life-saving fall program with a visit to Tryon by the Bloodmobile on Monday, August 25.

The Bloodmobile will be at the Episcopal Church Parish Hall from 12:30 p.m. to 5:30.

Anyone 17 years old, who weighs more than 110 pounds, and is in good health can donate blood, the Red Cross says.

The Red Cross hopes that a higher than average number of donors will be on hand Monday since the continuing need for blood at St. Luke's Hospital and by doctors in this area has been exceeding the rate of donations so far this year.

For those who have never donated a pint of blood the process is easy, the Red Cross emphasizes. "Come to the Episcopal Parish Hall at your convenience between 12:30 and 5:30 on Monday. You will be examined by a qualified nurse who will record your blood pressure, pulse and take your medical history. After that, it takes only six to eight minutes to transfer a pint of your blood to the blood bank. In doing so, you may save someone's life."
