Girl Injured In Fall of 100 Ft. At Big Bradley Falls

The Polk County Rescue Squad was called to Big Bradley Falls. Holbert Cove Monday afternoon about 5:45. Wendy Boone, age 16, of Spartanburg was standing near the top of the falls when she slid on some slick rocks and plunged about 100 feet. The accident happened about 4:30, but it took over and hour for anyone to get to a phone for help.

She had fallen in rough terrain and it was about 8 p.m. before the rescue squad with the help of the Saluda Fire Department and County Department was able to move her to the road. The men formed a relay brigade where different ones carried her for a while and passed her on to someone else

She was taken to St. Luke's Hospital where her condition was stablizied and then transferred to Spartanburg General Hospital where her father is the

Spud Ravan of the Polk County Rescue Squad said that she had head lacerations and injuries, cracked ribs and punctured lung. He said that in addition to the Saluda Fire Department and the Polk County Sheriff's Dept. that the Tryon Police Dispatcher with radio contact was a big help.
