Twelve cyclists from the "Outward Bound" program were passing through Polk County Friday morning enroute to the Outerbanks.

More than 6,300 exotic birds, from tiny finches to large parrots and macaws worth up to \$5,000 each, have been destroyed at an import center at Miami, Fla. because of an outbreak of Newcastle disease, a virus that kills domestic poultry. The birds were killed to try to keep the virus from spreading to domestic poultry flocks.
