Weather Tuesday: high 62, low 55, rain at 7 a.m. Wed. was 1.02 inches. During September the precipitation was 8.66 inches. The aver for Sept. is 4.94 inches. To date the area has received 56.77 inches of precipitation and the average to date is 47.53 inches, leaving a surplus of 9.24 inches.

The U. S. announced Tuesday that it has sent Saudi Arabi four highly sophisticated planes to strengthen the Saudis defense against the neighboring Iran-Iraq war.

Iranian warplanes attacked Baghdad's nuclear research center Tuesday, but the atomic reactor was not damaged the French Embassy reported.

The U. S. government technically was left without pending authority when the House and Senate negotiators, deadlocked over public funding for abortions, broke up in disagreement Tuesday night, missing a midnight deadline for passing an emergency spending bill needed to keep the government running.

Williamsburg Tour

The Tryon Community Schools are planning a motor bus trip to historic Williamsburg, Virginia, December 1, 2, 3, and 4. This is planned as a Tryon Community Schools Project, open to the public as a cultural opportunity, with a package plan for the four days.

The group of 46 persons will stay at the Williamsburg Motor House with single, double and triple occupancies available. Cost will include round trip bus fare, three nights lodging at the Williamsburg Motor House, baggage in and out, three plantation breakfasts and dinners at two of the famous restaurants in restored Williamsburg, King's Arms Tavern and Campbell's Tavern.
