He began his long association with General Motors in 1927. He was honored in 1977 at a meeting of the Carolinas Chevrolet dealers for 50 years of service as a dealer.

He was owner of Ernest Burwell Inc., Investments, founder of S. C. Automobile Dealers Association, former director of the National Automobile Dealers Association and had been chairman of the Business Management Committee.

Mr. Burwell was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree from Wofford College in 1978. He was a member of the Spartanburg County Foundation, has been president of the Salvation Army Board, president of the Spartanburg Kiwanis Club and co-founder of the Spartanburg Mental Health Clinic. He helped establish the Kiwanis Christmas Basket program in Spartanburg.

Through his efforts in organizing the local Naval Reserve Officers unit after World War II, Burwell, a five-year navy veteran was instrumental in establishing the Naval Reserve Armory in Spartanburg.

He has been director of what is now the United Way, helped establish the United Student Loan fund and sponsored the Burwell Campus Center building at Wofford College. He helped to raise funds for cancer research through the Sloan Foundation.

Mr. Burwell had made his home here for the past 34 years. His former home (now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Frazier) had vast plantings of azaleas and camelias and other flowering plants. Mr. Burwell introduced many new varieties of azaleas and camelias to this area.

He is survived by his wife, Ethel McMurray Burwell; a son, Ernest Burwell, III of Spartanburg; a daughter, Faith Burwell Stewart-Gordon of New York City; brothers, retired Brig Gen. James B. Burwell of San Antonio, Texas and retired Air Force Col. Clyde M. Burwell of Asheville; sisters, Mrs. Lilla Bell Welsh and Mrs. Josephine Shaffner of Charlotte; one grandchild.
