Thirty-one years of professional therapy background brings Nell Deaver to the executive secretary post of the Hospice movement in Polk County and upstate areas of South Carolina. She will serve in the capacity of a volunteer to help the local program get underway.

A resident of Tryon since 1974, her credentials include: U. S. Army Medical Department captain's rank, a faculty position at Duke University, and various major city hospital and university physical therapist clinical assignments.

Hospice is a specialized health care program for the terminally ill. A team of professionals embracing: a group of local area doctors, nursing personnel, clergy, and a battery of compassionate, trained volunteers offer an alternative to hospital isolation when a person is separated from home, family and friends. Hospice means home care.

Hospice is becoming a major force in North Carolina. Fourteen units are or will be operational shortly in: Winston Salem, Charlotte, Wilmington, Durham, Chapel Hill, Hickory, Asheville, Hendersonville, Gastonia, Raleigh, Pinehurst-Southern Pines, Burlington, Greensboro, Beaufort and Polk County.

A broad based Hospice funding program, with tax deductible benefits, is about to be announced. Meanwhile gifts or memorials are being solicited.
