Allen Rickman of the Polk County Sheriff's Department stated that no foul play was suspected and that the wound was apparently self inflicted. The case is still under investigation.

Martin Hired As Recreation Director

On November 14th at the Sunny View School the County Commissioners held their last meeting before the new Board takes over on December 1st. A resolution was passed in approval of Industrial Bonds to be issued towards enabling the Messenger Manufacturing Company to follow through with its plans for moving to Polk County. Tabled until December 1st was the question of appointing an interim County Manager, as well as other new business concerning a case of foreclosure, and a salary adjustment in the office of the Register of Deeds.

Jeanie Martin of Columbus is to be hired as the County's Recreation Director. She is one of seven applicants, all of whom were highly qualified. Her own qualifications include a college degree and experience for six years as a Basketball official.

Commissioner Sauve' will be in contact with the North Carolina Department of Human Resources on the subject of a medical plan for the county jail; while Gary Durham is still expected to discuss the matter and attendant problems, with the Board.
