Church Women United

The pews of the Church of the Good Shepherd on Markham Road were filled to capacity by the seventy women who attended the celebration of World Community Day by Church Women United on Nov. 7th.

Leonard Porter reviewed the history of the church which was originally established for the benefit of the slaves on Green River Plantation. The earliest building was burned out and replaced about 80 years ago. Not in use in 1955 it was made available to the present congregation.

It was too large to be moved to Markham Road in one piece, so it was cut into 12 sections and each was brought separately to the present site. The wood panelling and interior lay-out have been preserved so that the character of the church has been little changed.

The Parish House has added about 1965. Besides serving the regular purposes, it is the center for the R.I.F. (Reading is Fundamental) program for pre-schoolers. This program under the direction of Lenore Robinson is supported by volunteers from C.W.U. Any interested person wishing to join the effort will be welcome.

The Reverend Mr. Ralph Bonacker, vicar of the church, spoke on the purpose of World

Community Day which was first designated in 1943 during World War II in an effort to stress the need for women of the church to work together for justice and peace. reporter.
