There was lots of excitement in the area Saturday night as there were reports of UFOs, airplane crash, etc.

Shortly after 9 p.m. Saturday people from a wide area reported seeing a glowing object which lighted the sky. The only possible explaination was a meteorite or a satelite burnin g as they hit the earth's atmosphere.
