## Trucker Pinned Inside Vehicle

Robert Eugene Fwatt, 43, of Greenville, Michigan was trapped inside the cab of his truck for over an hour Saturday morning at the junction of I-26 exit and Hwy. 108 at Columbus. He was freed by the Polk County Rescue Squad and taken to St. Luke's Hospital where his condition was listed as stable. He suffered a broken arm and leg.

The truck owned by Transportation Sales, Inc. of Auburndale, Fla. was going south on I-26 and after taking the I-26 exit ramp, the trucker failed to stop when he reached the stop sign before entering Hwy. 108. The vehicle tried to turn right toward Tryon but flipped on its side and crashed into the guardrail in front of Columbus Quick Amoco.

Patrolman David Satterfield charged the driver with failure to decrease speed to avoid an accident. The truck was a total loss.

The Columbus Fire Department was standing by in the event of fire. The Polk County Sheriff's Dept. handled the crowd control and traffic.
