The area was hit by a fierce March wind as it roared through Monday. The upper shed at Harmon Field lost the roof over about 26 horse stalls. Duke Power reported that about 500 homes were without electricity as trees went down over lines and over the area. Some homes were without electricity from about 3 p.m. Monday to 6 a.m. Tuesday. The Duke Power crews were out all night repairing lines.

A tree went down on Elbert Carpenter's house on Meadowlark Drive and knocked several holes in the roof.

There were a number of instances of minor damages to signs, roof, etc.
