Weather Monday: high 94, low 71. That's hot! The early mornings have been nice, but after that it heats up.

Britain agreed Monday to cut the price of oil it produces from the North Sea by \$4.25 a barrel, a further sign of the downward pressure on world oil prices.

Authorities in Texas pulled more bodies out of swollen rivers Monday as the death toll from a weekend of torrential rain and tornadoes in the central and eastern parts of the nation rose to 20. States of emergency were declared in Kansas and Ohio as surging rivers and creeks went over their banks and roared into homes.

GE lays off 8,000 production workers at its Appliant Park in Louisville, Ky. to adjust inventories. The total is half the production force at the plant, which is General Electric's largest appliance manufacturing facility.
