The extraordinary security necessary to protect and house accused presidential assailant John W. Hinckley, Jr. has topped more than \$220,000 according to government figures. The extra expense went for extensive examinations by court-appointed psychiatrists, extraguards, around the clock protection, overtime and trips to medical facilities outside the prison.

President Reagan on Thursday gave his Cabinet its first look at the new rounds of budget cuts he wants. The president publically voiced displeasure at Wall Street's sluggish response to the elements of his economic program already adopted.
