School Vandalism

Vandalism and larceny has become a problem at schools in District 1 and the board of trustees on Tuesday night discussed the possibility of installing alarm systems at the schools.

More than \$28,000 worth of equipment has been stolen over the past two years. Slightly less than half has been recovered. Superintendent H. E. Hipp said the cost of installing the alarms could range from \$1,200 to \$2,000 per school. No action was taken on the matter.
