Weather Monday: high 67, low 26, humidity 37%. Tuesday morning was sunny and warm.

Hijackers forced three Venezuelan jetliners carrying 262 people to land in Columbia in a highly coordinated operation Monday, freed 67 of their hostages and then ordered the planes to Honduras and Guatemala. A fourth plane, a airliner, Libyan was commandeered over Italy by three Lebanese Moslems who forced it to land in Beirut, Lebanon.

President Reagan rejected on Monday the denial by Col. Moammer Khadafy that Libyan terriorists have been sent to the U. S. to kill government leaders. "I wouldn't believe a word he says," Reagan declared. "We have the evidence and he knows it."

Without new spending cuts or tax increases, the federal budget deficit will be \$109 billion this year, \$152 billion in 1983 and \$162 billion in 1984, according to new administration estimates.
