Vowing that "their crime will cost them dearly," President Reagan suspended credit and commercial ties with Poland's new military rulers Wednesday night and warned the Soviet Union of similar reprisals if the repression continued.

Federal Judge Marion J. Callister of Boise, Idaho, ruled Wednesday that Congress acted unconstitutionally in extending the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and that five states were within their rights to rescind approval. The National Organization for Women plan to appeal his ruling to the Supreme Court.
