Weather: Friday: high 43, low 28, hum. 87%; Sat.: high 38, low 28, hum. 80%, at 7 a.m. there was .97 precipitation or 7 inches of snow; Sunday: high 42, low 35, at 7 a.m. .37 precipitation; Monday at 7 a.m. there was .02 precipitation. During February there was 9.42 inches of precipitation. The average for February is 5.66 inches. To date there has been 18.01 inches of precipitation and the average to date is 10.59 inches, leaving us a surplus of 7.42 inches since the first of the year.

The sun certainly looked good Monday morning. The area was surprised by the large snowfall last Friday. The first reports were that it would be an inch or two turning to rain. A big change from the high of 82 last Wednesday.
