Weather Friday: high 70, low 40, hum. 48%; Sat.: high 70, low 55, hum. 39%, rain .55; Sunday: high 78, low 43, hum. 16%, rain .17. Monday morning was cloudy with an occasional shower.

Sports Reporter Wins Block House

A large crowd witnessed Sports Reporter with Kevin Doolan up win the Block House Steeplechase Saturday. The unheralded horse broke out of the pack of a closely bunched 6-horse field to win by four lengths. Owned by Richard Bromze of Lawrence, N.Y. and trained by Leo O'Brien of Ireland, Sports Reporter ran the Block House race in 3:42.0.

Pala Mountain, ridden by 18-year-old Bernie Houghton and trained by R. B. Houghton, was second while Bay Ridge Bill, with Jane Sloan up, came in third and Mark Stickley rode slight favored Triple Try to a fourth place finish. The purse was \$12,000.

Un Adios, the Chilean horse, easily won The Doncaster. Last year Un Adios won the Block House. He was ridden by Mark Stickley. Second place went to Zwenmarino, ridden by Paul Sloan and owned by Houghland. In third place was Schnapps, owned by Mrs. James B. Allen and ridden by George Sloan. Mark McMillan rode Cross Road Kid, owned by Louis B. McMillan to a fourth place finish. The purse was \$3,000.

The Carter P. Brown, a 2-mile run over fences was won by State of Siege, ridden by Mark Stickley, owned by Augustin Stables and trained by Sheppard. The time was 3:53.0. In second place was Too Tall Tom, owned by Charles L. Heekin and ridden
