The Save Our Suburbs have petitioned the N. C. Superior Court to stay the Town of Tryon Annexation Ordinance which was to take effect on June 1st. The petition was filed April 21st in the Polk County Superior Court and the stay of Annexation was granted by Judge Kirby in Henderson County on April 22nd. The next step is up to the Superior Court to decide if the Annexation Ordinance is legal.
