Weather Wednesday: high 63, low 35, hum. 82%. At 7 a.m. Thursday the precipitation was 26 and it continued to rain.

The British customs officials said they foiled an attempt on Wednesday to supply Iraq with 40 U.S. made devices for triggering nuclear explosions, and that three people were charged. U.S. and British investigators worked on the case for 18 months.

Lithuania's government backed down Wednesday on one of its hottest points of conflict with the Kremlin, a plan to establish its own border guard, saying it wanted to avoid clashes with Soviet troops.
