Financial Condition Fine, Auditors Say

Polk County closed out the 1989-90 fiscal year June 30 with \$834,000 cash on hand, reported Bob Beam, from the accounting firm of Crisp, Hughes & Co., to the Polk County Board of Commissioners Monday.

The county had money in the general fund, and \$429,000 in its savings account, or "fund balance." That fund balance equaled a healthy 8 percent of the county budget, Beam said.

Beam said the county's financial position was much improved over its condition just a few years ago.

He did point out a few areas for improvment, including increasing the rate of tax collections, now 94 percent, and more carefully and quickly accounting for funds shifted from one account to another within the budget.
