The weekend weather:
 Friday, high 93, low 69, hum.
 55 percent, precipitation .05;
 Saturday, high 92, low 72, hum.
 60 percent; Sunday, high 88,
 low 66, hum. 68 percent, pre-
 cipitation .02. By 7 a.m. Mon-
 day another 1.32 inches of
 rain had fallen.

So far this year 30.66 inches
 of rain has fallen, a sur-
 plus of 1.51 inches over the
 average. Last year by this time,
 37.56 inches of rain had fallen.

The Tryon Town Council met
 last week and had a surprise
 visit from Bill Williams, the
 district supervisor of all N.C.
 Alcohol Law Enforcement
 agents in a 17-county district.

Williams reviewed with the
 council its options for holding a
 referendum vote to eliminate
 certain kinds of establishments
 selling alcohol.

The commodities to be dis-

 flour, honey, green beans,
 vegetarian beans, peanut butter,
 canned pork or beef, raisins,
 egg mix, pears and rice, apple-
 sauce and cheese.
