Anonymous Gift Honors Culberson

Paul Culberson, Executive Director of the Polk County Community Foundation since 1977, has just been recognized for his outstanding contributions to all areas of the community by establishment of the Paul Culberson Agricultural Development Fund, within The Foundation.

According to Foundation Chairman Joe Claud: "This initial anonymous contribution of \$10,600 to the fund is seed money, hopefully, for establishment of a substantial corpus from which earnings will be used for the advancement of agriculture in Polk County and environs of South Carolina."
