Wolverines Victorious In 1st Round Playoffs

Polk County wrapped up a 26-12 win over Elkin Friday night in the first round of the State 1-A playoffs.

Elkin took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter, Sean Cunningham threw a 67 yard pass to Otis Miller to set up the Wolverines first touchdown. Cunningham ran the ball 5 yds. for the score. Kip Stokes ran the two point conversion to give the Wolverines an 8-6 lead.

In the second quarter, Kip Stokes ran 1 yard for a touchdown to give Polk County a 14-6 lead.

Sean Cunningham scored late in the third quarter on a 1 yd. and 4 yd. runs. Elkin scored a touchdown in the last two minutes of the game, giving Polk County a 26-12 victory.

Coach Stokes said the Wolverines "played good. We had no fumbles, no interceptions and made the plays we had to make."

Polk County will host Robbinville Friday night in the second round of the State 1/A playoffs.
