Did you know that 51% of the residential dwellings in Polk County use well water for their water source? This year the Polk County Advisory Extension Council members identified safe drinking water as one of communities' main concerns.

On Thurs., Jan. 30 there will be a special educational program on well construction and maintenance, sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of Polk County.
