N.C. 74 Section Opened To Hwy, 9

The section of N.C. 74 from Hwy. 108 near the new high school to Hwy. 9 in Beulah, near Polk Central High School, opened recently.

The paving work was com-pleted ahead of the schedule estimated last spring by N.C. Division of Highways Construction Engineer Leon Price. He had estimated the completion date as July, 1992.

Price said the last section of the Charlotte-to-Asheville highway is also ahead of schedule.

H.B. Rowe Construction Co. of Mt. Airy is underway on its \$13.8 million contract to grade the 6.4 mile stretch of N.C. 74 from Beulah to Rutherford County. Rowe is also building the bridges in that section, to include a bridge across the Broad River.

Once Rowe is finished, a paving contract will be let. Price said the grading and bridge work was scheduled for completion June 1, 1993, but he now expects the work will be finished in 1992.
