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#### Landrum Employees May Face Drug Tests

Landrum Town Council is looking toward drug testing for all present and future town employees.

"I think we really need it," said Landrum Police Chief Gary Laughter. "The way society is now, there's a lot of people who get on depressants and things like this," he said.

New employees cannot be tested without a drug testing policy in effect, he pointed out.

Administrator Doug Landers said he doesn't believe that Landrum has a drug problem with town employees, but he doesn't mind having a drug testing policy.

If the town's employees are required to undergo drug testing, the town council members should be subject to testing as well, said Doug Brannon.

However, drug testing for employees involves an expense and must be done periodically, not just once. Laughter said.

Mayor Robert Cogdell, who introduced the drug testing idea, said that from what he hears the cost is \$36 for each test.

"All municipalities and industries are going to this," the mayor said.

The administrator and council members will talk with employees and other cities with drug testing policies before discussing the matter in a work session next Monday.
