Weeders Garden Club To Meet

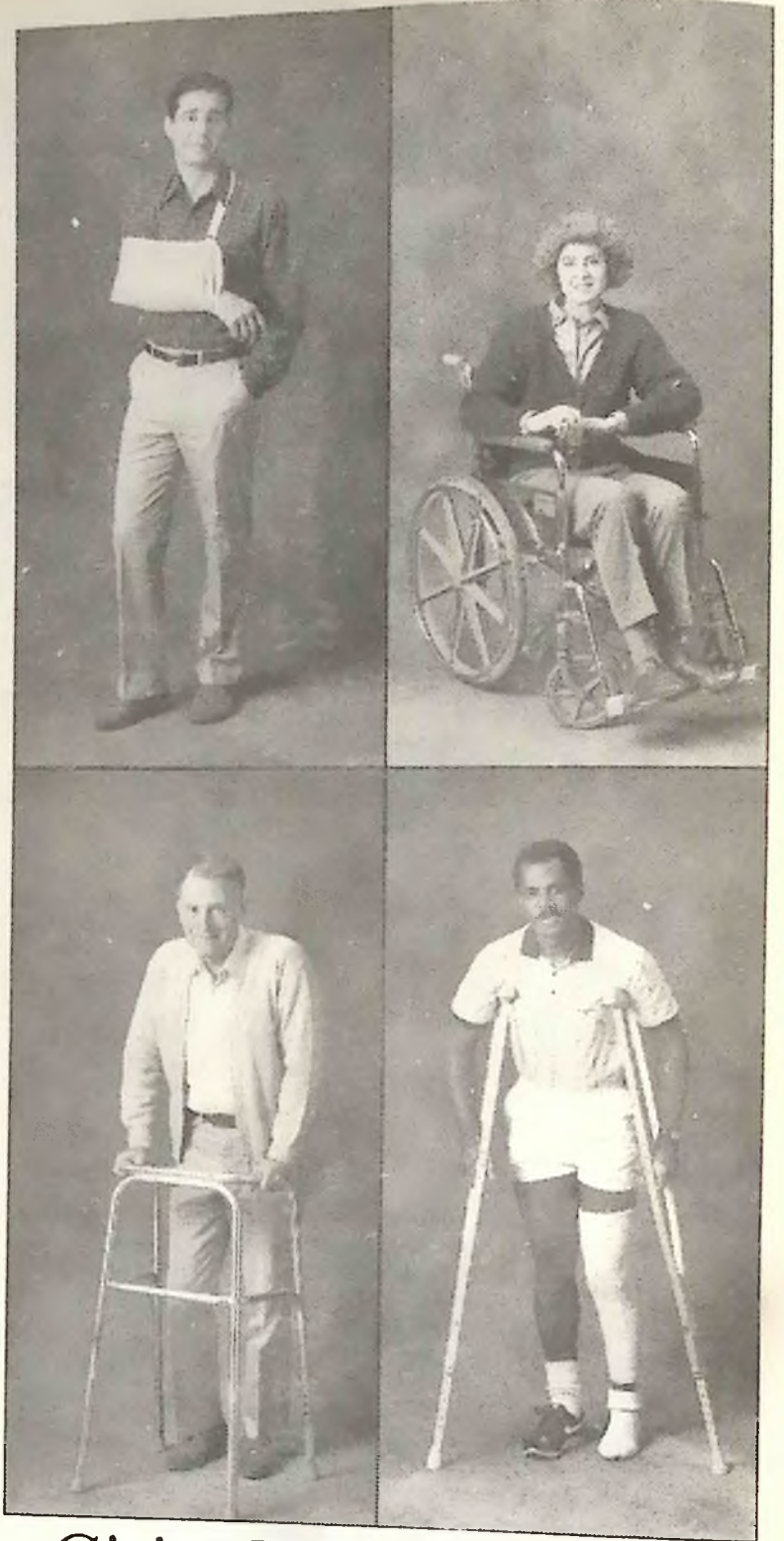
The Weeders Garden Club will meet on Wed., April 15, at 3 p.m. in the Del Guercio Room of the Landrum Branch Library.
