inches of rain. The high temperature for the month of May was 89 degrees, reached on May 23, and the low was 38 degrees, recorded on May 9. The final rainy week of the month pushed the total rainfall over the average by .99 inches. Total rainfall was 6.85 inches for the month. So far this year, 28.05 inches of rain has fallen, 1.07 inches more than average.

Polk County has a median household income of \$26,967, slightly above the state average of \$26,647. The national average is \$30,056.
