The apparent high bidder for the Red Fox Country Club was in town over the weekend to inspect the property.

Tony Jackson, Red Fox club professional, said Gene Holbrook of Kannapolis, N.C. was in town to inspect Red Fox.

Holbrook is the owner of Home Realty Co. in Kannapolis, but a worker there said he spends most of his time in Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Holbrook was unavailable for comment, as were real estate agents handing the sale for the Resolution Trust Corp. (RTC).
