

erally rain blackbirds. Several hundred fell within a small radius. The others continued on. The victims seemed to have been killed instantly. There was no sign of outward violence

Always ready for such an emergency, various "authorities" advanced theories to account for the extraodlinary happening. One was that some form of atmosphereic electricity did the job. Another was that conflicting radio currents in some fashion electrocuted the birds. Still another was that the birds flew into an "air pocket," such as aviators encounter, and were killed by the suddenness of the drop or rise of the air pressure.

The State experiment station made short work of such ideas. After examining the organs of the dead birds, Dr. J. B. Litman, director, explained that all of the dead birds had feasted on Japanese beetles, which had been sprayed with a deadly poison used by farmers in fighting fruit pests.
