DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

A series of educational motion picture films, which depict in a most striking manner the processes employed in the mining, preparation and utilization of the various mineral materials, is available for distribution in North Carolina. By J. B. Williamson, supervisor of visual Education, at Raleigh. These films, which were produced by the Department of the Interior, through the Bureau of Mines, in cooperation with the larger industrial concerns, tell the story of the workings of the nation's tremendous mineral industries in a much more vivid and colorful manner than is possible through the medium of any printed page. Another series of films preaches the doctrine of "safety first," by showing safe and unsafe methods in mining and metallurgical practice. Nearly a hundred educational films have been prepared in the past few years by the Bureau of Mines in cooperation with industrial concerns. The demand for these films for showing by educational institutional institutions, churches, civic bodies, and other organizations has become so great that the original plan of centralized distribution from the Pittsburgh Experiment station of the Bureau of Mines has become inadequate. A selected list of the best of these films is now made available at distributing centers located in the different states. The films relate to coal, petroleum, sulphur, iron, asbestos, zinc, marble, copper, natural gas, and other minerals. A series of films depicts most interestingly such industrial processes as the manufacture of oxygen, the making of fire-clay refractories, the manufacture of automobiles, the methods of compressing air, the quarrying of limestone, etc. Other films illustrate dangerous and safe practices in mining, efficiency in the combustion of coal, the utilization of water power, and the operation of a gasoline motor.

More than one thousand reels of motion picture films, selected for their educational and entertaining value, are now being circulated among the schools of North Carolina by the supervisor of visual education. In a recent six-month period, 106,000 persons attended exhibitions of these films, and indications are that even these figures will be doubled in the next six months. Nearly a hundred schools throughout the state have purchased motion picture projection machines through the supervisor of visual education, the machines being supplied to the schools at a substantial discount. Films are furnished free of charge by the supervisor, except that transportation charges both ways are paid by the exhibiting school. Full details as to the procedure necessary to obtain these industrial and educational motion picture films, which comprise a wealth of material from other sources besides the Bureau of Mines, may be obtained by addressing J. B. Williamson, supervisor of visual education, Raleigh, N. C. The flood waters surged under the coffin and raised it out of the grave to the side of the Wilson-Raleigh highway. The body was laid to rest for the second time yesterday. Many persons living in the immediate vicinity, have become aroused over the flood feature and some have threatened to move, unless the casket was buried in another cemetery.

WINTER CARE OF RADIATOR

"Every motorist should give special attention to his radiator during the winter months." "Neglect of this vital part of his car will result in much annoyance and expense. To prevent damage to both motor and radiator, an anti-freeze solution should be used. However, before employing the anti-freeze, the radiator should be thoroughly washed out with a solution of lye and water to remove the scale or mud accumulated from the driving of the summer months.

"There are many patented anti-freezing solutions, but we recommend a mixture of alcohol with water. By using such a mixture you will avoid running the risk of rusted radiator or cylinder trouble. In deciding the correct mixture for different temperatures, this table may be followed:

Wood Alcohol. 10 per cent—18 degrees F. above. 20 per cent—5 degrees F. above. 30 per cent—9 degrees F. below. 40 per cent—23 degrees F. below. 50 per cent—36 degrees F. below. Denatured Alcohol. 10 per cent—24 degrees F. above. 20 per cent—16 degrees F. above. 30 per cent—7 degrees F. above. 40 per cent—2 degrees F. below. 50 per cent—8 degrees F. below.

"Since alcohol evaporates more quickly than water, it is best to add equal parts when the solution in the radiator is low. A good suggestion is to add a pint of glycerine when filling the radiator for the glycerine will float on top of the solution, and prevent rapid evaporation of alcohol. During the winter months, the radiator should be protected. A leather cover or a blanket are suitable for this use. More attention also should be paid to the battery and generator. In the winter with the shorter days and longer nights, the charge is not kept going like in the summertime, so the reliability is not the same.
