

Boston, Nov. 26, 2 P. M.
The ship Alabama, Capt. Wise, from Liverpool, Oct. 19, with a general cargo, bound to this port, on running into the Bay, wind blowing a gale, from the north and very thick weather, at 1-2 o'clock yesterday morning, struck on Minot's ledge. The ship swung round head to wind and backed off. Finding the wind in a sinking condition, an attempt was made to run her on again, but she was found to be unmanageable. Three of the boats were then got out, which took off the crew and two cabin passengers—the Rev. B. O. Connor, of Milton, Ireland, and John H. Conner, of Liverpool, at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. The passengers and crew got on board ship Bombay, from Manila, bound for Boston. The Bombay arrived about noon, yesterday. Capt. Wise came up to the city in a pilot boat. The ship now lies 1-2 miles N.E. of Minot's ledge in 46 fathoms water—with foremast gone. Nothing can be saved but her main and mizzen topmasts. Officers, crew and passengers saved nothing but what they stood in.
