IRELAND. Noble prospects have been opened on the bills of indictment against O'Connell, Mitchell, and others, on account of insurrections. Other indictments are to be made out.

The following address has been issued to the friends of Ireland in America, dated Dublin, April 22nd: "TO IRISHMEN IN AMERICA.—You have recently resolved to convene a convention of the Irishmen of the United States and the two Canadas, to be held at Albany on the 3rd Monday in the month of July."

"The government with which we are allied and destroyed, are using every art and artifice to drive us into a premature revolt whilst we do not yield from the advantage ground by rashness. Neither must we lose it by hesitating. Every event apparently goes to prove that they will not yield gracefully, the demands of this kingdom for self legislation and self taxation."

"Ireland cannot, must not, yield. This is our real position, which I expose to you thus plainly, because I desire you to be equal to the occasion now presented to Ireland. Summon it quickly. Organize the contributions you propose to levy for Ireland—lose not a day in this good work. Remember, for every hour you lose, Ireland may lose a generation."

"We do not want you to fight our battles. We have men enough still for that, but I unhesitatingly ask you to place your ever share of your worldly goods that are superfluous to you at the service of Ireland. (Signed) THOMAS D'ASSY MCGEE, P. S. The council of three hundred, which will assemble here before many weeks elapse, will constitute a power with which you can properly correspond."
