COMMERCIAL.

REMARKS ON MARKET.

TURPENTINE.—Since Thursday morning, about 800 bbls. of Turpentine arrived in market and were disposed of at the following prices: viz. 65¢ bbl. Dip at \$2.45, and 112 bbls. of Yellow Dip and Virgin (a prime lot), changed hands at \$2.50 per bbl.

ROBIN.—No sales that we are apprised of. For Common Robin 65 cts. has been offered.

TAR.—None in market—it is in demand.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Sales of 101 bbls. Spirits Turpentine have been made at 29 cts. per gallon, and we hear of 100 bbls. changing hands of 30 cts. per gallon.

SHINGLES.—An engagement of 400,000 shingles, of good quality, was effected at \$2.00 per M. Lumber—1 Raft of 60,000 feet Boards and Scantling was sold at \$34 per M for scantling and \$44 per M for wide boards.

BACON.—A sale of 1,300 lbs. of Sides and Shoulders N. Carolina Bacon, was made at \$74 per cwt.

BOSTON MARKET.

Aug. 21—Flour is a shade higher on account of the very small supply at market, and common brands Western cannot now be bought under 5.50, while some holders ask \$5.62; fancy brands \$5 a 6.50 per barrel.

Corn is quiet, and also but very little in market. Southern yellow in small lots at 65 a 67c; and white at 60 a 62c per bush.

New Southern Oats have been sold at 30c; old do. at 40 a 42c, and for Northern, which contain less, 57c per bush. Potatoes are firm at \$1.50 cash, and 12 c. mos. for mess; \$9 a 9.50 for prime; \$13 a 13.50 for clear; and \$14 a 14.50 for extra clear, 4 mos.

NEW YORK MARKET.

Aug. 23. The Steamer Crescent City arrived here this morning from New Orleans, making the voyage in seven days and three quarters. She touched at Havana. Brought a large number of passengers and much freight.

The transactions in stock have been only to a moderate extent. Treasury notes, 10's and U. S. 6's, new loan, 106 25 a 104 50. Kentucky 6's, 97.75. Exchange on London, 9 a 9 1/2 per cent. premium.

There is a better feeling in the flour market, caused by the light receipts and supply. Sales of 4,000 bbls. in all, at 5.25 a 5.37 for common Genesee, and 5.18 a 5.25 for Oswego and Ohio. Southern brands held at 5.27 a 5.50. Sales of corn meal at \$1.18 and of rye flour at 84 per bbl.

Wheat is considerably inquired for, and sales of Genesee have been making at some extent at 1.18 a 1.20 per bush; red do., 1.08 a 1.10—about 8,000 bush sold. Corn is in demand, and prices have an upward tendency. Sales of mixed at 53 a 56 cts., and of yellow at 58 a 59c. The transactions amount to 30,000 bushels. Rye, 73 a 74c, and oats 35 a 40c per bushel, with sales. Rice is steady with sales at \$3.94 per cwt.

Provisions without much change or movement.—There is less demand for pork, and the tendency is downward.

The grocery market is firm but not active. Sugars and coffee steady. Whisky is selling at 23 1/2 a 24c per gallon.

A fair demand for cotton and the market firm.—Sales of 400 bales at previous rates.

Naval stores are quiet—the demand being only from the trade, no sales of moment transpired.

PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

Aug. 23. Transactions in stocks to-day have been only to a moderate extent. Sales of Treasury notes, 6's at \$104, and of U. S. 6's, new loan, \$104. Nothing new in other leading securities.

There is a fair demand for flour, and sales of about 1,000 bbls. at 5.18 a 5.25 for Penn. common brands. Rye flour 3 87 a 3.93, and corn meal 2 75 a 2.81, with sales.

There is only a moderate supply of grain. Wheat is in fair demand, with sales of 6,000 bushels at 1.05 a 1.08 for red white do., 1.18 a 1.20, such as is suitable for family flour. Corn rather heavy—sales of yellow at 58 a 60c, and mixed 54 a 56c—about 9,000 bushels sold. Rye 72 a 74c; and oats 28 a 33c per bushel.

Nothing new to notice in provisions or groceries; fair transactions at previous rates. Rice \$3.97 per cwt., and steady.

Whisky is firm, with sales at 24c per gallon, in barrels.

Very little doing in cotton. Holders are firm, but purchasers do not manifest much disposition to operate.

North Carolina Institution for the instruction OF THE DEAF AND DUMB.

THE Sessions of this Institution, commences on the first day of July of each year, and continue ten months, when there is a vacation of two months, giving the Pupils an opportunity to visit their Parents and Friends.

The Institution is situated on Caswell Square, about one-third of a mile from the State House. The ground occupied by the buildings with that adjacent, is the property of the Institution, and granted by the Legislature of the State. In extent it embraces four acres, a part of which will be cultivated, and the remainder will constitute spacious Lawns, where the Male Pupils will amuse themselves, at proper hours, in athletic sports, and the Females, in walking, or such other kinds of exercise as may be appropriate to their sex.

The main building in the dimensions of its plan, is sixty feet by thirty six. It has two wings, each thirty-eight feet by twenty six, extending at right angles from the main edifice, and projecting from each extremity of it nearly the whole width of each wing. In elevation it endures four stories, including the basement, and the wings three, and is surmounted by a tower or observatory, commanding an extensive and beautiful prospect. In the basement are the dining-room and store-rooms, and in the story above the basement, are the parlor, sitting room and library. In the other stories are the family apartments of the Principal and his assistants, and two rooms set apart for the Pupils in case of sickness. In the basement of one wing are the kitchen and wash room, and that of the other is set apart for instruction in mechanical trades. On the principal floor of the wings, are the sitting-rooms of the males and females, and the upper story is occupied for dormitories. The chief merit of the arrangement consists in its preserving three departments—as far as relates to the accommodations, amusements and pursuits of the Pupils out of school, so independent in every particular, as to constitute of them two separate and distinct communities, while the dining-room in which both assemble, with the Teachers and family of the Principal, is conveniently accessible. Each department has its separate areas in the rear, its separate pleasure-grounds, and its separate communication with the school-rooms; so that for the ordinary purposes of life, there is no occasion to pass from one to the other.

The Act of the General Assembly, requires that when Deaf-Mutes are unable to pay for their maintenance and education, the Justices of the several Courts of Pleas and Quarter Sessions, should levy in the same manner as taxes are now by law levied for the support of the poor, seventy five dollars for the support and maintenance of every such Deaf Mute as shall be selected by the Literary Board, for the purposes of Education.
