

P. S.—April 8.—Since we wrote the above the steamer Isabel has arrived from Charleston with letters from London to the 9th, and from New York to 29th March. No business is done now on account of the Easter holidays; but the more favorable advices for Sugar from Europe can hardly be expected to have any influence upon our market, our actual prices being already much above the value of the article there, and the accounts from the United States are unpropitious.

Of Sugar we place our quotations as follows: Middling to good Whites, 10 1/2 a 11 1/2; fine Whites, 12 a 13; forster Whites, 13 1/2 a 14; Yellow, 7 a 8; Browns, 5 1/2 a 6 1/2; Churuchos, 5 a 5 1/2.

Sales of Muscovados have been made at 5 a 5 1/2 for ordinary to middling, 6 a 6 1/2 for fine to good to choice.

The supplies of Coffee are moderate, and sales are made at 24 1/2 a 26, according to quality.
