SEALED PROPOSALS.
Will be received, at their office in Pittsburgh, Clatsop County, North Carolina, until the 14th November next, for the construction of twelve Dams over the Cape Fear River and thirteen Locks, including one guard Lock; also for the excavation necessary for deepening and widening half a mile of old canal at the Rockhewn Falls. These Dams will vary in length from 400 ft. to 700 ft. They are to be located upon the dam and rock making entire across the river, and as the depth upon those ledges is about 1 foot, no Coffers Dams will be required. They will be constructed of timber hewed to a square of 12 inches, laid in parallel lines, connected by cross-ties running at right angles, and forming Girds which are to be well hand-packed with stone. The foundation to be the dam and rock making entire across the river, with a long up stream slope, cut off at such a distance from the overflow, as to leave the vertical face at the toe of the dam, on the up stream side, about one-fourth the height of the dam. Along this up stream face, there will be a double course of masonry piers, the dam will rest and resting to some extent upon the abutment of the dam, there will be placed a heavy bed of gravel. The whole of the framing will be secured by dovetailed joints, bolts and trenails at the crossing of the timbers.
The Locks will be a modification of those generally known as the "Compartments"; the walls will be formed of alternate grade timbers 12 by 12 inches, connected by cross-ties similar to the dams and the crib-work packed with stone. There will be a double course of sound planking, with water joints to the Lock Chamber. The whole framing will be firmly bound together by dovetailed joints, bolts and trenails—as in the case of the Lock Chamber and the 18 in. in width and 100 ft. between the gates. The timber and lumber has been contracted for and is now being delivered at the sites for the different works. The Proposals will therefore be made for the workmanship and construction of the Dams and Locks (only) and for the stone packing, which is to be found in abundance at the sites of the different works. The stone packing, necessary for putting in the Locks, need not be included in the bids, as those will be put up by the Navigation Company; but the Pumps must be furnished and worked by the contractor.
The Proposals will be:
1st. For the framing and construction of the Locks and Dams, per 1,000 ft., board measurement, \$2.
2d. For all Stone Packing, per cubic yard, 10 cts.
3d. For all Rock Excavation in foundation, per cubic yard, 5 cts.
4th. For the Workmanship of all Plank, per 1,000 ft., board measurement, 5 cts.
5th. For all Iron Bolts and Straps, per pound, 5 cts.
6th. For all Spikes and Nails, per hundred, including driving, 5 cts.
7th. For all White Oak Treennails 16 by 2 inches, per hundred, 5 cts.
8th. For all Mire Sills and Hollow Queen Posts, including Printing and Securing in their proper position, per linear foot, 5 cts.
The Gate will be made under a separate contract. Plans of the above work will be exhibited, and specifications for the same delivered to the Contractors, at the office of the Engineer of the Company, in Pittsburgh, at any time when called for. After the receipt of the Proposals, time will be taken for the consideration of the same, until the 17th of the same month, on which day, in case the Proposals should be found satisfactory, the several works will be let by separate contracts. The Proposals will be received until 12 o'clock, P. M. on the 17th of the same month. In addition to the usual reservation of 20 per cent. on the monthly estimates, the Contractor will be required to give ample security, satisfactory to the Board of Directors, for the completion of the work at the time, and in the manner required by the specifications. For the information of the several Contractors, the work will be intended that they can travel by Rail Road and Steam Boat, to within 30 miles of the line of improvement. It is believed that no work can offer greater inducements to the Contractor than this. The health of the country, the abundance of provisions, of all kinds—and the facility with which labor can be obtained—will be found to be the chief force together with the probable extension of the work, for some 200 miles beyond its present terminus, all combine to render a position upon this work, to an enterprising Contractor, desirable.
