Burr lived in New York until the year 1839, we believe, when he died. The last years of this life were passed in compara-tive obscurity Some few old friends, who had never deserted him, were his companions; they closed his eyes in death, and followed his body to the grave, where it will rest till the trump of the Almighty shall call it into judgmant.

Such is the brief sketch of the latter part of the strange and eventful history of Aaron Burr. None of the family now live; it has become extinct; and his name but lives in the history of his country, and in the remembrence of those who knew him.
