

Gov. Appoints Drayton

Dr. Jerry Drayton, pastor of New Bethel Baptist Church was appointed Chairman of the North Carolina Human Relations Council by Governor James B. Hunt.

The Human Relations Council was established by Executive Order in January 1963 as the Good Neighbor Council by former Governor Terry Sanford. In 1967 by an act of the State legislature it became the official State Agency charged with the responsibility of promoting orderly progress

toward a life of equal opportunity, Justice and Human Dignity for all citizens of North Carolina. The council is also responsible for investigating charges of racial discrimination in state agencies, lack of job opportunities for minorities and women. The council will report its findings directly to the Governor and make recommendations for action. Dr. Drayton brings to

He was the first black to serve as President of the interracial Board of Directors of the Winston-Salem Urban League. He has served as President of the North Carolina Baptist Interracial Fellowship.

Dr. Drayton holds an A.B. degree from Morehouse College, Atlanta, Ga.; B.D. degree from the graduate school of Religion, Howard University, Washington, D.C.; a Honorary Doctor of Divinity, Virginia Theological Seminary and College, Lynchburg, Va. A certificate in Pastoral Clinical Training, Bowman Gray School of Medicine, Winston-Salem.

Dr. Drayton is married to the former Susie Jones and have one son who is a graduate of Morehouse College and is now a senior in the School of Law at the University of Washington in Seattle, Washington.

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911 Service Begins June 7

Only residents of the City of Winston-Salem should dial 911 for fire or police emergency service. City residents should also dial the ambulance service, 727-2222, directly.

All Forsyth County residents living outside of the City should continue to call the County Fire, Sheriff, or Ambulance services directly. Non-City residents calling 911 only delays response time because those calls will have to be relayed to the appropriate County agency.

Remember, 911 is a police or fire emergency number. It should not be used for information of any kind. Please consult your telephone directory or call 727-2705 for governmental information.
