public jobs are wrong — minimum wage rather than prevailing wage scales for the jobs in question. Also the plan is vague on what kinds of jobs will be created. Too much leeway is given to welfare administrators to decide who will have to work, and for other technical decisions that have have tremendous impact on poor people. This could be avoided by

making the jobs program part of a national full employment policy divorced from the welfare program and by using the refundable credit income tax as the major income assistance device.

Those two steps would do away with the inequities still embodied in the reform, and would also simplify the income assistance program by reducing the awesome administrative complexities that also characterize the present welfare system. The Administration's plan.
