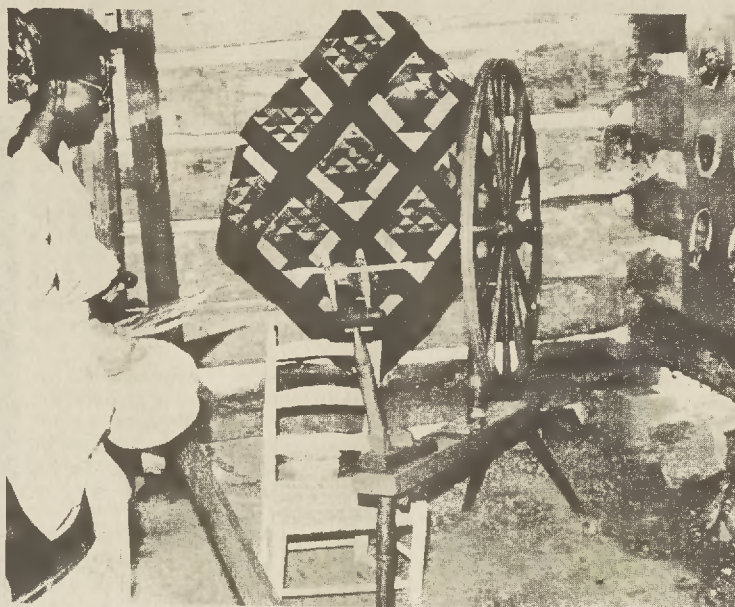

BBAL Sponsors LaTerre Forum

The Black Business Action League of Winston-Salem sponsored a multi-faceted banquet at LaTerre XXI Monday evening. The evening featured a panel discussion, two keynote speakers, and a fashion show.

Clayton Lovell, personnel director at Wachovia Bank Inc. and local NAACP president Patrick Hairston were the main speakers. Mr. Lovell

discussed the problems of black businesses--such as the lack of working capital available to most black businessmen and the urban flight of many successful blacks, and suggested some solutions to these problems.

Patrick Hairston stressed the importance of the black business in community unification. "The problem with the black church," he com-

plained, is that they preach waiting for your reward in heaven. We want prosperity while we're here."

The panel members who participated in a discussion of black business opportunities were: Dr. Raymond Oliver, WXXI's Jane Harrington, mayoral candidate Cecil Butler, County Commissioner Mazie Woodruff, and attorney R. Lewis Ray.

Agency Offers Advice

The Early Childhood Development Planning Association of Forsyth County is an organization designed to help "young children and their parents."

Association director Cheryl Hope explained that the organization is basically an information agency, which will advise parents on choosing a day care center for their child, or give information to persons interested in keeping small children.

The Association also has information on other child related matters, such as child abuse, nutrition, and health care. If a person requests help in any of these areas, the Early Childhood Development Association will refer him to the proper agency.

It is funded through CETA, private foundations, and city and county funding, and staffed with CETA employees and community resource persons. Its function is to

cooperate with agencies, institutions, and individuals in providing programs to meet the needs of children and their families, establish community goals for quality child care, and provide co-ordinative approaches to solving problems inherent in fragmented programs.

There are 120 day care centers in Winston-Salem.
