"I don't know of anyone who is against keeping down property taxes," said Bethea. "And if blacks were in the organization they could make their concerns known."





CECIL C. SUMMERS of Winston-Salem has been selected to appear in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.


The honor is conferred annually upon outstanding student leaders from approximately 1,000 colleges and universities in the United States.
