Salem Students Organize Club

Onua is the name chosen by an organization at Salem College-- formed by a group of black students with the purpose of providing a support group for new black students at the college.

They explain that the name Onua is from a tribe in Ghana and means sister or brother in the sense of the extended family. The group will sponsor programs-- including several

during Black Awareness Month (Feb., 1981)-- and will be open to all students interested in the quality of life for black students.

The group itself, is new-- but blacks at Salem Col-

lege are not: one of the earliest students at what was to become Salem Academy and College was black. "And in 1785, Adam Schumacher, a member of the Salem congregation

who lived on a farm a few miles from town, asked that a Negro girl on his place be permitted to attend the school-- a request that was granted apparently without question."
