"All I Ever Wanted To Do

"Bighouse" Gaines said "I got my nickname when I was a student at Morgan State University. As I was getting out of my Ford, someone commenting on my size said the only thing they'd seen bigger than me was a house." Gaines is athletic director, department chairman and basketball coach at Winston-Salem State University.

"I feel like I've played all my life because coaching is the only thing I've ever wanted to do and it's something I enjoy doing," he added.

"Probably the two most exciting and memorable times I've had here at WSSU was the time we won our first CIAA Championship in 1953 and the time we won our First national NCAA Championship Division II in 1967.

"The most frustrating time was during the finals at Norfolk State University about four years ago. We had posession of the ball and there was five seconds left in the game. One of our players threw the ball to an opponent who made a basket. I was on my way to shake hands with the other coach as the victor. What I really wound up doing was congratulating him."

His intense love of basketball is also shared by his wife Clara during their 28 years of marriage.

"When I first met my wife she didn't know that air went into a basketball. Now, though, she's a great coach's wife. She helps me recruit players and tells me of every mistake the team makes whether we win or

lose a game," said Gaines. ... In addition to being coach, athletic director and department chairman "Bighouse" is a coordinator for the Winston-Salem State. University Parochial School Physical

Education Program, the Experiment in Self-Reliance Summers Sports Program and NCAA National Youth Sports Program. He is a consultant for basketball clinics in North
