If a good reason for rejecting or refusing to accept duct, then you can get back any payments that me made to the seller. But if you are going to reject e a product, do it right away. The longer you he harder it will be to get your money back. You careful to explain to the seller the exact reason or s why you will not accept the product - that is, wrong with the product. The best way to do this is e the seller a letter. Send it by registered mail. Keep of the letter for yourself. Do not give the product to the seller until he returns your money. Put the away in a safe place and do not use it at all. If se the product you will not be able to get your back. If the seller still refuses to return your payontact a lawyer



However, Rev. Williams, who was at the Memphis with the King murder, but Motel where Dr. King was shot, did not believe that Ray pulled the trigger. Williams said he was certain that Ray did not act alone and thought that "the investigation was a whitewash." Williams also contended that, although the investigation stated that Ray escaped from Memphis in a White Mustang, he firmly believed that Ray's car never left Memphis.

The allegation that a power struggle was going on inside SCLC and that certain members of the organization were guilty of misusing SCLS funds was also discussed. Atty. Johnson responded by stating that he and all of his distin-

guished colleagues, which included Chairman Stokes,

gave the investigation everything they had and that there was no evidence to

support the claim.

On the other hand, Rev. Williams again flatly stated that the investigations were not true; that he himself, a






