Paisley Precinct Changed

The Paisley Precinct boundaries have been changed. The Precinct has also been taken out of the Northwest Ward and placed in the North Ward.

All registered voters who live in the area bounded by Northwest Boulevard and 26th Street which lies between the Cherry-Marshall Expressway and the Children's Home property are in the Paisley Precinct. They vote at Paisley High School.

Voters in the Paisley area should report to Paisley High School to cast their vote in the November 3 Election. They should report to Paisley although they may have received a card prior to the Primary on September 22 indicating that they were to report to some other precinct, or even if they experienced some difficulty voting at Paisley September 22.

Voters on Cherry Street from the 1400 through the 2300 block and those on 24 1/2 Street from Cherry-Marshall to old Cherry Street, were assigned in error to and voted at Paisley during the primary in September. They should return to Paisley to vote

during the November election. After the election November 3, they will be transferred to the correct precinct.

Due to the realignment of the wards and the reorganization of some precincts, voters on numbered streets (11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 20th, 24 1/2, 25th, 25 1/2 and 26th Streets) and some voters on Harrison Avenue were placed in error on the rolls of other precincts. They have been placed back on Paisley's rolls and should vote at Paisley November 3.

The staff at the Board of Elections has been working since the September Primary to return voters left off back to the Paisley Precinct Rolls. They will not have time to remove the Cherry Street voters and those on 24 1/2 Street from the Paisley Rolls so they will vote again at Paisley for the November Election only.

Voters who read this article are urged to advise others in the area of its contents. If this is done, it will expedite the voting in the Paisley Precinct November 3 and all who are registered will have a chance to vote.

More than a fourth of the persons who came to Paisley to vote in the Sept-

ember Primary found that they were not on the Paisley Rolls. However, all who were registered were able to cast a vote. They should not have any trouble November 3.

Mitchell Seeks Help For Minority Business

Congressman Parren J. Mitchell (D-7th-Md.) will request the U.S. Justice Department to investigate what he describes as "a conspiracy" against Wallace and Wallace Chemical and Oil Corporation.

Mitchell reports that Charles Wallace in 1974 sought to build an oil refinery in Macon, Alabama, and from the inception of the project, local, state and federal entities used almost every device at their command to thwart the construction of the first Black owned oil refinery in America.

The Maryland Congressman was especially critical of the Small Business Administration. "It is my firm belief," he stated "that S.B.A. imposed certain contractual requirements on Wallace and Wallace with the full knowledge that those requirements in and of themselves almost guaranteed that the oil refinery would not succeed."

Mitchell added that a recent court decision, which

ordered that a minority firm be reinstated to 8-a status demonstrates that the Small Business Administration did indeed make arbitrary and capricious demands on a minority firm. This case involved Oklahoma Aerotronics, Inc. which had been dismissed from the 8-a program. On August 27, 1981, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia ordered that Oklahoma Aerotronics, Inc. be restored to 8-a status, citing that the S.B.A. acted unlawfully arbitrarily, capriciously and abused discretion.

"I believe a similar verdetta pattern was followed by S.B.A. in the case of Wallace and Wallace" Mitchell said, "and we must not, cannot permit the stilling of minority enterprises in this fashion!"

On August 27, 1981, Wallace and Wallace filed suit against the Small Business Administration in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia seeking injunctive relief.
