Court Of Appeals Affirms Forsyth Verdict

A Forsyth County jury verdict which awarded \$1,925 to a Winston-Salem tenant has been upheld by the North Carolina Court of Appeals. The Court this week dismissed an appeal by landlord C.W. Myers of Winston-Salem in which Myers sought to have the verdict overturned.

Mrs. Katherine Burns brought suit against Myers in May, 1979, claiming that the condition of the house at 1807 Longview Drive which she rented from Myers was unsuitable for habitation because he failed to make necessary repairs. While Mrs. Burns lived in the house the furnace was often inoperable, the roof leaked severely, the plumb-

ing had numerous defects, the electrical system was deficient, and the floors were substantially rotted away.

At the trial in August, 1980, a jury awarded Mrs. Burns damages for Myers' failure to make all repairs necessary to put and keep the premises in a fit and habitable condition within a reasonable time.

The jury award consisted of a refund of Mrs. Burns' rent for the months she went without heat and for damages to her property caused by the conditions in her house. The total award was \$1,925.

Myers appealed the decision, but the appeal has been dismissed.

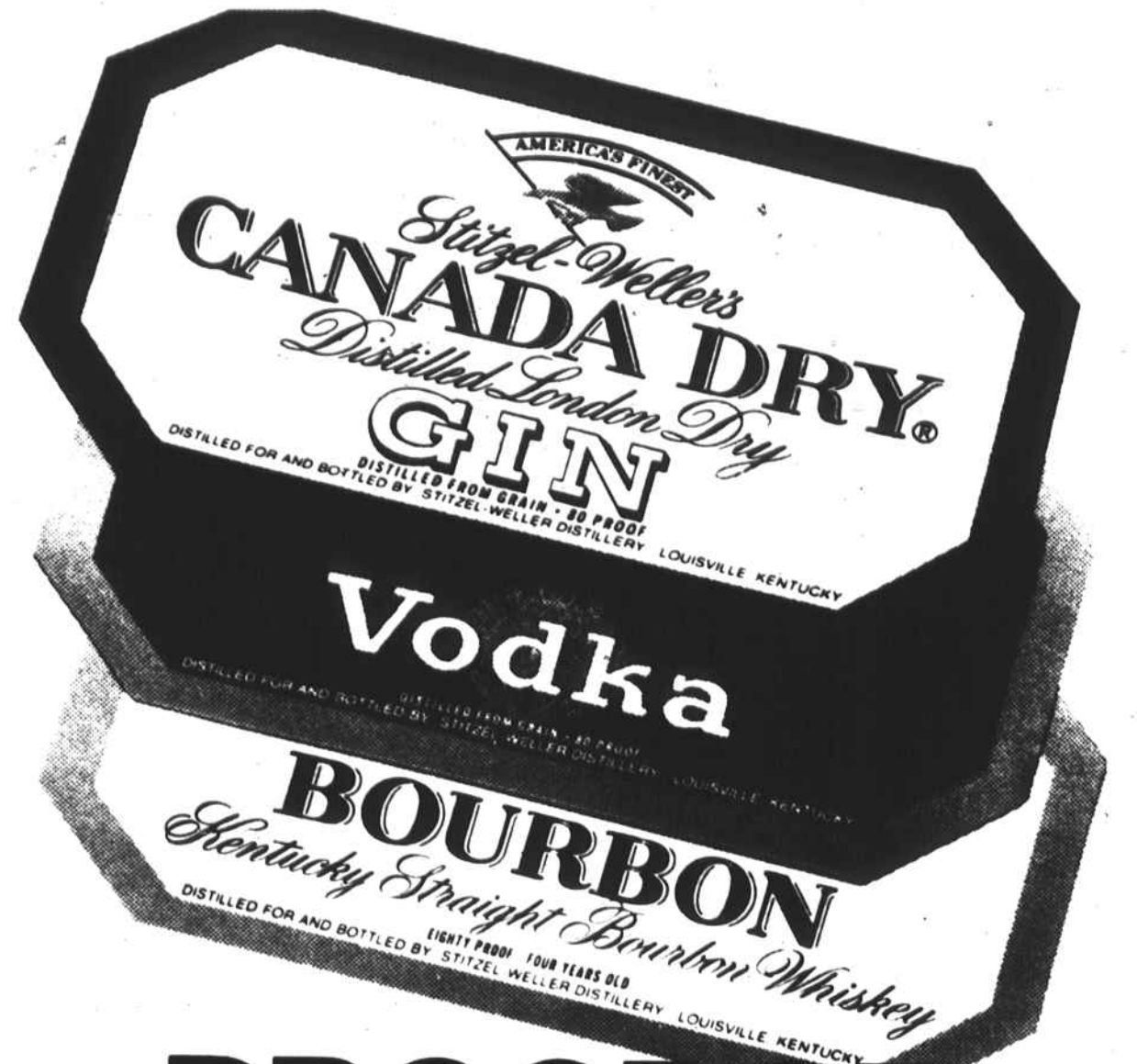
