Hauser Selects Gaines

Dr. C. B. Hauser, retired Winston-Salem State University professor, announced that he has appointed C. E. (Bighouse) Gaines treasurer of his pending campaign for a seat in the North Carolina House of Representatives.

Hauser, a Democrat, who has been active in the community in a number of organizations since he returned to Winston-Salem in 1956, is making his first try for an elected office. For some time Hauser says, he has been quietly sounding out potential supporters and forming a tentative campaign organization.

Hauser adds that at the urging of friends and members of the community, he decided to run when it was learned that some of the incumbents would not seek re-election and to in-

sure that there would be a black among the county delegation.

"I have devoted a great deal of my time to community betterment activities," Hauser said. "Now that I will be giving up the chairmanship of the Patterson Avenue YMCA Board of Management and end my tenure as a Dixie Classic Fair Commissioner, I will have more time for other activities. I look forward to working at the state level to help make North Carolina a better place in which to live and work."

Gaines, head basketball coach and athletic director at Winston-Salem State, said that "because of Hauser's long history of service in this community, he has earned credibility in both the black community and the community at large. He will make a viable candidate and an effective public servant. I am honored to be associated

with his campaign."

Although the primary is not until next May, Hauser and Gaines stated that the announcement at this time would be of great benefit to the campaign and would be helpful to persons who are still looking for an opportunity to take the maximum tax benefit of political contributions in 1981.

Hauser said that he has been very pleased with the response to his campaign thus far.

"I'm real optimistic," he said in an interview Monday afternoon. "I'm out there, I'm meeting people and I'm getting good response."

Hauser added that he has selected a campaign manager although he is not yet ready to make his or her identity public.

Major planks in the Hauser platform will include support of the Equal Rights Amendment and emphasis on quality education.

Carver Faculty Disturbed By Sentinel Editorial

Faculty and students at Carver High School are fuming over an editorial written in the Dec. 14 edition of the Winston-Salem Sentinel in which reference is made to a drug problem at the school.

The unsigned editorial, entitled "A Workable Plan," addresses the four-year high school transition plan submitted by Superintendent of Schools James A. Adams and highlights problems left unanswered by the school board's proposals. But the article also mentions a drug problem at Carver, "Public suspicion is sure to linger over the classroom environment at Carver," it says.

"where drugs have been acknowledged to be a problem. Special efforts will have to be made to overcome such sensitive difficulties."

Thirty-nine Faculty members signed a Dec. 16 letter to the Sentinel stating that they resented the implications of the editorial. "We think we have a good school as evidenced by our athletic and academic achievements," the letter reads. "We work hard to provide a classroom environment in which learning is encouraged and achieved. We challenge you to compare our records—including our drug records—to the other schools."

"I thought it was very unfair unless somebody can

support this statement," said E. R. Parker, Carver principal. "I would like to see the factual evidence that the article is based on."

But both the publisher of the Sentinel, Joe Doster and the editor who wrote the article, John Falls, insist that the article was only citing problems in the general school system that must be addressed in the four-year plan.

"We don't think that Carver has any more of a problem than the other schools," said Doster. "We just feel that the school board has a false opinion and that these are things that need to be addressed and corrected."

the Board of Alderman held Thursday night, Dec. 10, the board voted to send the revised application to Washington. Later that night, Alderman Virginia K. Newell arrived at the Urban League Banquet at the Benton Convention Center to give the news and solicit contributions to

make up for a \$100,000 deficit needed to complete the package.

"All told, I think we received commitments totalling \$150,300," said Joines. Part of the sum was donated by Hanes Dye and Finishing, which pledged \$25,000.

The reduction in the amount of the first mortgage means an increase in the value of the equity of \$125,000.

The East Winston Local Development Co., headed by attorney R. Lewis Ray, has spearheaded an effort to raise the equity and ensure community ownership of the shopping center.

Ray, along with Newell raised \$125,000 to complete the package and make the community of East Winston partial investors as mandated by HUD.

Jack Flynn of the public affairs department at HUD said that the lean was

approved because of the firm commitments that were submitted. "Yes, there was firm and fiscally sound commitments and a good balanced ration, so we said yeah, let's go with it and give them the lean," he said.

The East Winston Shopping Center is proposed for a 7.6 acre tract of land north of East Fifth Street between Cleveland and Claremont Avenues and is expected to cost \$1,975,000

Food Town, Revco Drugs Stores, Pic 'n Pay Stores Inc., and Family Dollar Stores have agreed to leases for 39,000 square feet in the 45,000 square-foot center.

Along with the \$425,000 investor equity funds and the UDAG, the remainder of the \$1,975,000 will come from \$419,000 Community Development Funds, \$85,000 City matching funds and the first mortgage of \$706,000.

acts, we as black people need the NAACP and the NAACP needs us. We don't have the time to bicker over somebody who admits his guilt and says he was entrapped."

As far as McGee is concerned, Hairston said, he is "a nice man who has friends. If a friend's in trouble, you don't ask about his moral conduct. You just go to his aid. But a whole organization can't do that."

"As a person, my feelings have not changed," he said. "I still think Bill is a nice man and I don't think he knew anything about drugs. But I know what he did was wrong."

Corporation (\$150,000), the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation (\$150,000), Wachovia Bank and Trust Co., (\$100,000) and ARA Slater Co. (\$45,000). The university's Board of Trustees is also included in the campaign with pledges made by all board members.

"We are very heartened and encouraged to have such a generous response from the community and the university board this early in the campaign," said Horrigan.

"There are two additional soliciting divisions scheduled to kickoff their activity in January, primarily to contact individuals and smaller businesses and industrial firms in the Winston-Salem area" Horrigan added.

The money already obtained is more than half of a \$3,000,000 goal needed to complete the construction of a new business building on State's campus. The money will also be used to provide endowment for the student scholarships in business, renovate and add to Blair Hall Administrative Center, provide for priority programs and curriculum needs above the anticipated level of state support, and to develop a new, unified student services center.

Also speaking at last Friday's luncheon was Dr. Douglas R. Covington, WSSU Chancellor.

"Winston-Salem State is in a period of transition" Covington said. "The student clientele is becoming diversified and the campus is being strengthened and expanded." Covington said that he was very pleased with both the community and university support that the university had received in the campaign effort thus far.

William Friday, president of the University of North Carolina system was also on hand to endorse WSSU's first capital gifts campaign in its approximately 90-year history.

"I strongly urge everyone to support this campaign," said Friday. "A contribution to the capital gifts program of Winston-Salem State University is a wise investment that will return
