Noted Black Journalists To Keynote Conference

GREENSBORO — Gil Noble, award-winning New York City television producer; Ethel Payne, veteran Washington correspondent, and Cliff Frazier, executive director of the Institute of New Cinema Artists, will serve as keynote presenters for the sixth annual A&T Mass Media Careers Conference at A&T State University March 25-26. The theme of the conference will be "Media Coverage of Minority Communities: A Current Assessment."

Noble will present the annual Kellogg Lecture at A&T on Friday, March 25 at 7 p.m. Payne, a writer and correspondent for more than 25 years, currently occupies the Ethel L. Payne Professorship in Journalism at Fisk University. She was the *Chicago Defender's* Washington correspondent for many years and she has enjoyed extensive international reporting. Payne will be the conference's luncheon speaker on Saturday at 12:30 p.m. in the Memorial Union. Frazier's appearance on the A&T program will be sponsored by the North Carolina Cultural Arts Coalition Inc. The successful television producer, author and teacher has pioneered in the training and placing of minorities and other disadvantaged individuals in broadcasting, motion pictures and allied media industries, and will conduct a Saturday workshop on "Improving the Image of Blacks in the Media."

The A&T conference is a project of the faculty and students of the university's mass communications program, with assistance from the Kellogg Foundation, the Gannett Foundation and the *Greensboro News-Record*. In addition to the keynote speakers, panelists for the conference will be print and broadcast journalists, media managers and educators from North Carolina, Virginia, New York and Tennessee.
